Evergreen "Bird-Walkers" visit to Random Harvest Bird Walk - 23rd July 2016

5 Evergreen "Birders" met at the "Pitstop" at 6.30am on a clear but rather chilly morning. Arriving at Random Harvest well in time for our 7am walk, we were first welcomed with tea/coffee and rusks. At 7am, proudly showing off our Evergreen T-Shirts (well we showed them off as the morning got warmer) we set off for a bird walk with Andre Marx, the guide.

Andre pointed out the many "LBJ's" (almost looking like dried leaves) gathered at the tops of the almost bare trees in and around the tea garden. These in fact were mainly Red Bishops, females accompanied by males without their red and black colouring, and weavers. We then set off down the road and were not allowed to include the geese, chickens and to our surprise the persistent male turkey, chasing two female turkeys (what a gobbling racket), in our bird count.

Our first exciting sight was the Bar throated Apalis which Andre heard and called it in with his bird caller. Interestingly he mentioned he was happy to call the bird in as it was not breeding season. At this point Andre encouraged us to listen for and try and identify birds by their call and then look for them.

On the way to the dam we passed empty fields where we saw many birds including all three Lapwings, the nocturnal Spotted Thick-knee (Dikkop) sleeping at the base of a shrub, the uncommon Ground scraper Thrush, accompanied by the African Pipit and beautiful orange throated Cape Longclaw. A flock of Red-Faced Mousebirds flew into the trees and Andre explained the way to identify Mousebirds in flight was that the Red-Faced flew together while the Speckled flew in single file. On seeing the Black Headed Heron Andre explained the difference between this Heron which favours open grassland often near but not dependant on wetlands and in flight has two-toned black and white underwing patterns whereas the Grey Heron favours shallow water and in flight entire underwing appears uniform dark grey. Approaching the dam an African Spoonbill flew across (one of which has recently been seen at Evergreen). At the dam we saw a beautiful Malachite Kingfisher as well as a juvenile Reed Cormorant which unlike the adult has white underparts confusing some with the White-breasted Cormorant. We then made our way back to the tea garden going through the nursery listening for and identifying more birds.

The visit ended with a delicious breakfast as we talked about what we had seen and tallied up our score of 45 birds for this walk with the Bar-throated Apalis, Cape Longclaw and Groundscraper Thrush being our special bird sightings.

Thanks to Kiloran and Dick Sheppard's efforts, we were privileged to have Vincent Carruthers, renown frog specialist, author and environmentalist visit our village. A group of about 20+ enthusiastic residents met him at Crab Crossing, went on a walk through the parkland and were then enlightened on the subject of frogs.



We started at Pond 1. He explained that the slow moving black masses that intrigued us so much in Spring last year (until wiped out by pollution) were tadpoles of the Red toad variety. This identification was confirmed from pictures taken of the toads. Those balls presented a much larger 'creature to' predators than single tadpoles swimming around, so there's safety in numbers! He advised that the fish endemic to this area was the Tilapia rendalii and encouraged us to stock the pond with this variety. Fish, and certain aquatic plants will also help reduce the algae problem in that pond.

Vincent was impressed with our wetland. He saw it as an important feature of our village and the fact that it was already inhabited by a number of frog varieties, crabs, Nile monitors and mongoose suggested that it was in good shape and encouraged us to do whatever we could to preserve and develop it.

The walk-a-bout was followed by an enlightening and entertaining talk in the clubhouse. He and a colleague, Louis du Preez had developed an app, 'The complete guide to the frogs of Southern Africa' that covered everything you'd ever want to know about frogs and toads.

Bull frogs were of particular interest. They emerge from their up to 1 m deep burrows once a year after the first rains. They breed on only one day year, and then only in very shallow pools or ponds! They were endemic to large parts of Gauteng, including the area where we are. Bull frogs are only active for about 1 month a year when, on the appointed day they mate and lay their eggs. During the rest of the month the eggs hatch, the tadpoles develop into baby bull frogs and adults and young feed voraciously, also cannibalistically, before burrowing underground again to hibernate for 11 months until the next rains come – an exciting life! There's a good chance that there are bull frogs present on the vacant lot below our village, and with luck some young ones could migrate here because our attention ponds with their gently sloping sides are ideal breeding grounds.



The pictures are of a male bull frog in full call and a mating pair. The other frog of interest, and we already have many of them in our ponds, is the Platanna, or clawed frog. Not only is this the only fully aquatic species, but up until the mid-'60's they were used world-wide in pregnancy tests and South Africa exported them by the thousand!

Apparently there were previously only 3 known frog enthusiasts in the village, but there's little doubt that after Vincent's talk there're going to be many more and no doubt we'll soon have a 'frog list' next to our 'bird list'!

Kiloran kindly arranged tea, coffee and cake that was served at the end of a very interesting afternoon!

Hello Graham,

While Marion and I flew off to Namibia, Isabella, Ivar and the Four Seasons gardeners worked wonders on the pavement, work for which I've received many undeserved plaudits! Thank you Isabella and Ivar, your efforts are much appreciated by many! The work isn't finished yet, but more about that later.

First some of the wildlife we had the privilege of seeing in Namibia: 2 of the 'small five' desert creatures, a horned viper and a desert chameleon and the some of the big five around the waterhole outside the Halali camp. If you've never visited this fascinating country, then add it to your bucket list – we had the time of our lives!



Back to the pavement. The gardening team - Elske, Emmy, Isabella, Marion and I - have finished the planning and work will start again early in August. So far, the pavement work hasn't cost a cent, but we cannot proceed much further until all the soil that was washed out of large sections of the pavement garden during the floods earlier this year is replaced. A request for funding has been submitted to AMDEC projects and we hope this will be approved in time for this to be done before Arbor Day. Why Arbor Day? We hope that we'll again receive your very positive support when our appeal goes out for Arbor Day funds. Provided we get that response, our signature project this year will be to plant white Iceberg roses next to the picket fence portion of the pavement so that we can have a magnificent display that will be visible from both sides of the fence. This then will be the residents' financial contribution to beautifying the pavement. We also plan to replace all those trees and shrubs that have died, and plant a few additional ones near the new clubhouse, so there'll certainly be some tree planting on that day! Winter has been very mild this year, but following the welcome rains (19 mm), the cold has set in with a vengeance as can be seen from these pictures.


