Greetings Graham,

I have always found the monthly edition of the "Chatter" most entertaining and interesting and wonder whether what I am going to suggest will be of interest to you.

It is, of course, quite well-known that Marjory and I wrote a book entitled "Our History of Love and Life", a copy of which we donated to the Library. The basis of information for our early lives from September, 1938 in England and then our respective homelands was the numerous letters that passed between Marjory in Australia and me in South Africa throughout the War years by sea, overland and by air, in various forms. I have all these letters with me to-day and have been fascinated reading them and recalling those interesting years.

Yesterday I was reading my letter to Marj dated 27th November, 1951 in which I responded to her enquiry about Travel Costs. She was planning to travel to the United Kingdom via South Africa. I give details of my response.

AIR Fares: Cape Town, Port Elizabeth, East London, Durban, Johannesburg, Salisbury and Cape Town. (My employers were transferring me to Salisbury.) Seventy Pounds, Seven Shillings and Zero Pence Cape Town, Salisbury, Johannesburg and Cape Town — Sixty-Four Pounds, Two Shillings and Zero Pence.

RAIL Fares: Cape Town, etc as above: First Class - Thirty Four Pounds, Fourteen Shillings and One Penny.

Second Class — Thirty-One Pounds, Nine Shillings and One Penny.

Having shown this letter to two neighbours and seeing their response, I felt it would be amusing to let others Evergreeners in on the act, so to say. My thought was that it could perhaps be a "Tail Piece" for your next edition. Cheers, CRAIG

Team Evergreen Walking News from Ernie

"As there are no planned walks in October 2016, we propose to have another "Evergreen Broadacres Fun Walk" similar to the one we held in March earlier this year on Saturday 22^{nd} of October starting at 4.30pm, after your afternoon nap. As before there will be 4 different distances to choose to walk varying from the 600 meter dash to 5kms. Therefore every resident from 59 to 99 years old and all staff members will be able to take part. So dig out your training gear now and start doing some training. In March there were 67 walkers and 13 in the back up team. So let's try and beat that now that there are many new residents and others who could not walk in March as they were either away on holiday, had double dated or were otherwise indisposed. The highlight of the Walk will be Moira Theron

demonstrating how to walk in her new line of footwear – a double thick soled slop. Details have not yet been finalised and will be sent to you as soon as possible. Remember to "Keep fit and remain Evergreen" – Ernie.

"A couple of years ago Sue and I adopted a school in the Eastern Province near Ugie. It was in response to an article on the Mud Schools which proliferate in that and other provinces. These were generally former farm schools which seem to have missed out with the new government. The kids are writing with pencils 40mm long sharpened at both ends, and the chalkboards are usually no more than A3 size scraps of board resting on the floor.

We took a load consisting of 10 chalkboards, old toys (they use them for prizes), old magazines (they cut out the pictures for spelling), assorted stationery, 36 tins of baked beans!, etc, the kombi was full up to the roof even after taking a row of seats out!

I am undertaking a visit in the summer to deliver some more items and ask if our Evergreeners can save up any items that would be useful and would be so gratefully received.

ENVIROMENT

Arbor Day 2016...every picture told a story in the Spring Special edition of Chatter.....

"Another successful Arbor Day has come and gone as was well reported in the Chairman's Special Spring edition. For the record we planted 17 trees and they're all looking good except 1 willow tree that appears to have turned up its toes. All the previously planted trees and shrubs were fertilised and pruned as well. We didn't plant the Iceberg roses on the pavement because of the water restrictions; many have already been purchased by fellow residents and the rest will be kept in their bags for sale to residents or until we decide where we can plant them in the common areas. A sincere thank you to all who participated!

The water restrictions have had a number of consequences. All the automatic sprinkler systems have been turned off. 1 or 2 of Four Seasons' gardeners will be in the village at 05.00 to water those common garden areas that require watering. An appeal has been made to residents to take on the responsibility of watering their pavement gardens. Any resident, who is not able to do so, should advise René so that other plans may be made. We have stopped further work on the pavement. We are investigating the possibility of installing quick coupling valves there to allow watering by hose. If those are installed, work will continue to finish the rest of the pavement to Phase 3.

Under the direction of our team of gardening ladies, some of the areas around Pond 8 (above Crab crossing) have been beautified with water loving plants, and the yellow water irises have started blooming. Summer flowering annuals will shortly be planted in some of the areas where the Namaqualand daisies have been removed. All the long grass in the parkland, and the bulrushes and reeds in the stream have been cut so we are all set for the onset of the rains and the regreening of our parkland.

Work has started on the new composting station at the bottom of the village and will be completed shortly after Tyris' TLB returns to site. In the meantime please continue dumping your composting materials in the bind provided next to the re-cycling station.
