#### WATER ALL LIFE DEPENDS ON IT

Last month we provided a number of tips on conserving water. We've spoken to many people that are not au fait with the actual water usage policies as they stand. So here's a 'refresher'.

**JOHANNESBURG** water was notified by Rand Water, its bulk supplier, on 24 August 2016 that it would be reducing supply by 15% effective from 6 September 2016. Level 2 water use restrictions mean all consumers must not water or irrigate their gardens between 6am and 6pm; and can do so only by using hand-held hosepipes or buckets/watering cans outside of these hours.

**CITY OF CAPE TOWN** watering/irrigation (with water from municipal supply) of gardens, lawns, flower beds and other plants, vegetable gardens, etc is allowed only if using a bucket or watering container. No use of hosepipes or automatic sprinkler systems is allowed. Cars and boats may only be washed with water from buckets.


