South Africa celebrates National Women's Day each year on 9 August. The day commemorates the 1956 march of approximately 20 000 women to the Union Buildings in Pretoria, and as a result, it remains the day which represents liberation, strength and equality to millions of South African women today.

Having to deal with oppression and inequality for centuries, there have been a ton of things women have had to fight for – like equal voting rights, equal pay, and to have their healthcare requirements met. EVERGREEN'S GOT TALENT. KEITH JEWELL - STILL SPARKLING AT 90

Born in the UK, Evergreen Muizenberg resident Keith Jewell started to play piano at age 5 and made his first solo appearance on stage when he was 6. He studied piano, organ, cello, clarinet and conducting at the Royal Academy of Music in London where he became a freelance musician as solo performer, accompanist, conductor, teacher and lecturer - also making recordings with the BBC Symphony, Opera and Light Orchestras.

Keith came to South Africa on a mail boat in 1953 and took up posts as organist for the St. George's Cathedral and City. He conducted orchestras and concerts, whilst freelancing in the major hotels including the renowned Mount Nelson where he developed his style of linking numbers together creating non-stop listening. He also became Head of Music at the College of Education, Musical Director of the Waterfront Theatre School and conducted many Concerts and Musical Shows.

Keith was married to his beloved wife Stella ('the best thing that ever happened to me') for sixty three years, and came to Evergreen last year, having spent the last decade living in Portland, Oregon with family- one of his two daughters and his grandchildren. His other daughter and grandchild live in Cape Town.

Keith's love for music has been a love of a lifetime: he names Bach as his primary inspiration for classic romantic music, though his own catalogue contains a large variety of light jazz. 
Broadacres: Eddy, Brian & John all celebrated their 80th birthday with cake and wine at their social evening.
