I am always amazed at the travels our residents get up to. Here is the first part of Basil Bold's trek to Italy.

The Italian Job

Part 1

In mid-July Marlies and I invited ourselves to a 3 week stay with Marlies' sister, Heidi (75) who lives in an unpretentious "Casa Viola" in the rural countryside of Emilia Romagna - a short distance inland from the Adriatic coast and about 20km inland from San Marino (famous for cheap cigarettes and petrol)!

The deal was that we offered our renovation services for some sorely needed renovation work in return for her fantastic hospitality (a gourmet cook of note) and an unlimited supply of Italian wine!

Heidi is one of about 15 German couples who has a summer residence in this charming pastoral setting. Most of the couples migrate for the summer months and then return to home comforts for the winter. Heidi's husband died some 12 years ago, but she has elected to make Italy her home. Almost without exception the summer residents have an artistic bent: saxophonist, guitarist, harpist, trained choristers, painters and potters – to name a few.

Within days we were invited to a musical evening in a quaint church in the town of St Agatha. The little church was packed to the rafters and the performers were an assembly of violinist from Australia, China, Poland, USA (et al). Apparently, they undertake this tour annually and surprisingly the performances are free. The performance was uplifting and the one Chinese violinist was truly exceptional

A few days later we went to a performance of Giacomo Puccini's opera 'Suor Angelica'.



Being familiar with Puccini works such as 'La Boheme', 'Tosca' and 'Madame Butterfly' we were looking forward to the show. The cast comprised 16 nuns and a death visage in sack cloth and ashes. After one hour with no scene or costume change, no action and decidedly tuneless singing the opera culminated in a crescendo of wailing and a general aura of doom and gloom. In fairness, the nun's voices were angelic, but I think Giacomo must have been smoking his socks when he wrote this - not his best effort!

Heidi's house is a solidly built, 100-year-old, 3 storied stone edifice (the walls are over two feet thick). This is fortunate because Italy is subject to continuous earth tremors. This is because the country is scrunched between the African and European tectonic plates. A case of the irresistible force (Africa moving inexorably northwards) meeting the immovable object (Europe). Practically all old buildings in Italy have cracks which are evidence of this ongoing drama.

The countryside is dotted with peaks which, almost without exception, have a castle/monastery or fortress perched atop. Many have been vacated and have fallen into disrepair, but some like San Marino and San Leo are alive and well. We visited San Leo and were shocked to find that, since we were last there, the one side of the mountain had fallen away into the valley, leaving the monastery perched on the edge of a cliff. One must admire the fortitude of the monks living there – knowing that at any time they could experience a sudden relocation to the bottom of the mountain!

And this from Sue Jackson

I have recently returned from a five-week holiday visiting my son and his family in Norway. I flew from OR Tambo to Stockholm because my daughter-in-law was attending a conference on an island called Gotland, which is in the Baltic Sea a short 35-minute flight from the Swedish capital.

The 2017 edition of Lonely Planet named Gotland 2nd on its list of the best places to see in Europe. Gotland was fascinating and my son Crispin and I and three and half year-old Scott spent one day touring around the island and three days in the wonderful medieval walled town of Visby. There are 100 churches on the island, built between 1100 and 1350. There is a beautiful cathedral in Visby consecrated in 1250 and we were there during a Eucharist service. I sat down to listen and apart from the language being Swedish, the Lutheran service took exactly the same format as our Christian services and I could easily follow it all.

We flew from Gotland back to Stockholm, an hour's flight to Oslo and then a two hour train journey to Lillehammer, where Crispin and his wife Torunn have a farm running organic sheep in Lillehammer, which is 190 km north of Oslo. Some of the barns on the farm are 350 years old, and most of the main house was built in 1860. It has been considerably modernised since they took over from Torunn's father in 2009. We spent 10 days on the farm and then embarked on a 6 hour drive southwest of Oslo to Arendal a beautiful Norwegian seaside town which lent its name to Arendelle, the imaginary town where the movie 'Frozen' is set.

Then it was back to Lillehammer for another 10 days.



The evening before I left we went to an outdoor performance of Peer Gynt which has been performed annually over a 9 day period since 1989 It is set in the Gudbrandsdalen valley, one hour north of Lillehammer. The venue is on the shores of a lake, with the Norwegian mountains as a backdrop in an area where the "real" Peer Gynt lived, on whose character Ibsen's play was based. What a treat. I went to an introduction in English before the play started, and followed the play in a summary booklet which described everything that was happening. Ibsen wrote the play and then asked his friend, Evard Grieg, a fellow Norwegian, to write the music. In The Hall of the Mountain King piece was wonderful, with the King being a troll who wants Peer to marry his troll daughter. Peer escapes, but she later brings him an 'ugly child" (with a troll tail) claiming it to be his saying "his thoughts were enough". Norway is a fascinating country, steeped in folk lore, Vikings, trolls and there is a great sense of nationalism amongst its people. It is a beautiful country and is on many a bucket list.
