Dear fellow Residents,

12th September, 2017

Please take note and make alternative preparation for extra travelling time/alternative routes if you use Cedar Road for negotiating to Fourways area for the next few days.

VALLEY ROAD (Entrance to Broadacres Shopping Centre) AND FREDERICK ROADS

Asphalting of the road between Valley Road and Frederick Road and between Uranium Street and Stinkwood Road will start today (12th Sept). Traffic flow will be congested between 08h00 and 16h00 and the plan is as follow:

- Entering Lombardy Road will be one-way traffic, between Cedar Road and Syringa Road (halfway along Lombardy).
- There will be no connection coming from Lombardy Road to Cedar Road on Tuesday 12 September and Wednesday 13 September between 08h00 and 16h00.
- Asphalting crossing Lombardy Road will be done on Wednesday 13th and waiting times to enter Lombardy Road will
 apply, please use alternative roads to enter Lombardy Road.
- Entrance to Cedar or Lombardy Road will be via Syringa Avenue to Rosewood Road and Haven Road or via Pine Road to Uranium Street.
- All the traffic will be moved onto one side of the road from the island at Valley Road on Wednesday 13 September.
- Entrance to and from Stratford Office Park will be controlled by means of a stop and go on 13 September during the construction.
- After completion of the asphalt between Valley Road and Frederick Road, all traffic will be moved onto the one side
 of the road from Valley Road to Uranium Street.

STINKWOOD ROAD TO URANIUM STREET

- Starting on Monday 18 September the asphalt between Stinkwood Road and Uranium Street will commence.
- Traffic will be moved onto the newly asphalted road between Stinkwood Road and Uranium, while repairs on the Uranium intersection occurs.
- By the 22 September, the road will be open from Valley Road to Stinkwood Road with one side traffic and from Stinkwood Road to Witkoppen Road all lanes open (two lanes both sides).


Two braai tools as described below were left behind after Saturday's street braai. They have been placed in the 'We found, you lost' box in René's office.

The Thursday Night Movie at 18.00 (6pm) is "Dunkirk" directed by Christopher Nolan ('Interstellar') and has roles for Mark Rylance, Tom Hardy, and Kenneth Branagh.

"Dunkirk" tells the story of a group of allied soldiers from Belgium, France, and the British Empire. When they find themselves surrounded by the Germany army on the beaches of Dunkirk, the film follows the story of the evacuation of 400,000 during the early stages of World War II.

Boasting a stellar cast, but as Tommy, newcomer Fionn Whitehead makes an astounding mark in his feature film debut. With no true lead in the movie, his point of view is often a crutch for the audience to rest upon, as his internalization of the character is one of the film's most pivotal high points. It is gripping from its very opening moments, in which we see soldiers getting picked off by invisible snipers in the middle of the titular town as propaganda flyers shower from overhead, announcing to the British, French, Canadian, Belgian and Dutch troops that they are hopelessly penned in by the Germans. Nolan makes the decision to avoid all of this explanation, and to give us a Dunkirk that focuses on the personal experiences of the war by land, sea and air.
