

- 5. Homes produce and store more electrical energy during the day and then they use and will sell it back to the grid. The grid stores it and dispenses it to industries that are high electricity users. Instead of 220 volt circuits, homes will have 440 volt circuits to charge cars at home. A baby of today will only see the cars of today in museums.

# The FUTURE is approaching faster than one can handle.

1. In 1998, Kodak had 170,000 employees and sold 85% of all photo paper worldwide. Within just a few years, their business model disappeared and they went bankrupt. What happened to Kodak will happen in a lot of industries in the next 5 to 10 years and, most people won't see it coming. Did you think in 1998 that three years later you would never take pictures on film again? Yet digital cameras were invented in 1975. The first ones only had 10,000 pixels (today's phones

with cameras have 15 million pixels), but what followed was Moore's law. So as with all exponential technologies, it was a disappointment for a time, before it became way superior and became mainstream in only a few short years. It will now happen again (but much faster) with Artificial Intelligence, health, autonomous and electric cars, education, 3-D printing, agriculture and jobs. Welcome to the fourth Industrial Revolution. Welcome to the Exponential Age.

- 2. Software will disrupt most traditional industries in the next 5 to 10 years.
- 3. "Uber" is just a software tool, they don't own any cars, and yet are now the biggest taxi company in the world.
- 4. "Airbnb" is now the biggest hotel company in the world, although they don't own any properties.
- 5. Artificial Intelligence: Computers become exponentially better in understanding the world. This year (2017), a computer beat the best "Go" player (Ke Jie) in the world ... 10 years earlier than expected. ("Go" is a complex board game that requires intuition, creative and strategic thinking. It has long been considered a difficult challenge in the field of artificial intelligence (AI) and is considerably more difficult to solve than chess.)
- 6. In the U S A, young lawyers already don't get jobs. Because of IBM's programme "Watson", you can get legal advice (so far, for more or less basic stuff) within seconds, with 90% accuracy compared with 70% accuracy when done by humans. So, if you study law, stop immediately. There will be 90% fewer lawyers in the future ... only omniscient specialists will remain. ("Watson" is a question-answering computer system capable of answering questions posed in natural language, developed in IBM's DeepQA project by a research team led by principal investigator Dr David Ferrucci.)
- 7. "Watson" already helps nurses diagnosing cancer ... its four times more accurate than human nurses.
- 8. Facebook now has a pattern recognition software that can recognize faces better than humans. In 2030, computers will become more intelligent than humans.
- 9. Autonomous cars: In 2018 the first self-driving cars will appear for the public. Around 2020, the complete industry will start to be

disrupted. You don't want to own a car anymore. You will call a car with your phone, it will show up at your location and drive you to your destination. You will not need to park it you only pay for the driven distance and can be productive while driving. The very young children of today will never get a driver's license and will never own a car. (to be continued)

Talking of the De Chalains, here is another one making news:


Hello Chris,

# Building an eBike (part 3) by Chris Edwards

(It's a bit technical but we have some people who understand these things)

The trouble when you build something like this from scratch you learn from your mistakes because nobody has done this before, in this part of the world, to my knowledge.

I had been using my bike for about two weeks when it came to a stop outside our garage and the display faded away, indicating a battery power failure.

I looked at the battery compartment and felt the cells, wow! one row of 3 cells was red hot. I took off the leads and let every thing cool down. Lithium-ion batteries have had a reputation for catching fire (Samsung Phones and Boeing 787's) so I had to be careful. I took the pack apart and measured the voltage of each group of cells. 8 volts, 16 volts, 24 volts and 0,0, volts. The meter should be showing me 32 and 40 volts.

As a result I had 2 cells measuring 0 volts each when they should be at least 4 volts each.

I thought the problem might be due to the battery pack being under strain when bouncing up and down on Evergreen 'cobbles'

So back to the Olivedale Battery Man who explained that they could not be recharged as lithium-ion cannot be recovered when 0 volts. These battery packs tend to fail, not because of vibration but, "Did I have a BMS?" he said. That's a Battery Management System and was more or less the first time I had heard about this. So back to the Internet. Deliveries from China are typically 6 to 8 weeks so I checked deliveries to the USA, 12 to 20 days!! We are off to Paris, New York and Washington in 4 weeks time so I arranged for delivery to our friend Todd who is meeting us in New York. Now when we come back I think I will be 'en Bike'.
