

Fortunately, John Schulkins knows Gill Ledger, an expert on wetlands, ponds and dams (the Dept. of Water Affairs consults her on the Hartebeespoort Dam) and they went to have a chat with her. They came away much wiser and immediately implemented some of her advice. Hopefully you've already noticed the difference! But there's more to come so watch this space!

What else from your ResCom?

- The 'Stop' signs proposed by Graham Brickett, our Safety, Security and Traffic Portfolio Leader, have been painted on all the roads leading into Heron Drive. Thank you to Graham and Village Management! His proposal to install more '20 km/hr' signs in Heron drive is still under consideration.
- Graham also identified the culvert under Frederick Road as a security risk and a proposal to install security beams has gone to Management.
- We are looking at a proposal to reverse the direction of the traffic in Loerie Lane.
- Would you like to know what the Municipal Valuation or Rates of your unit are? Simply write to the Village Manager and you'll get the answer.
- The problem of certain Residents helping themselves to overly large portions, thereby leaving other Residents short, has arisen again. We appeal to Residents not to dish-up for themselves, but to leave it to the Bistro staff.
- We are working on the Generic House Rules, i.e. those rules that will apply specifically to Broadacres



Here is the story of Judy Stowell's trip to EGYPT and JORDAN - October 2018

Judy and Anna, her school friend and travelling companion, were part of a congenial group of twelve (8 Australians, 2 New Zealanders and us).

Anna flew to Cairo from London and I flew Egyptair from Johannesburg. Amazingly we met up at the hotel in Cairo with very few hassles. We had an excellent female guide who had a history degree, she was an Egyptologist and had studied hieroglyphs, added to which was her charming personality.

It was a half an hour from the hotel and to the famous pyramids of Giza. We decided not to take the option to go inside the pyramid. Apparently very busy and hot and in places very low but crawling not necessary. (Not recommended for those with claustrophobia). We walked around and kept hydrated as it was $32 \circ C$. Drove to other pyramids and looked back at the two large ones. Though a hectic tourist attraction it was all most impressive and we really wondered how they managed to build them. Into the bus to go to the Sphinx and then on to the Museum. The Tutankhamun exhibition was a feast for the eyes, especially the well-known mask. There were five large gilded wooden boxes each in its own display cabinet and made to fit one inside the other. Also, we were impressed by the sarcophagi shaped like Tutankhamun which also fitted inside each other, reminiscent of Russian dolls. Tutankhamun's mummy was discovered by English Egyptologist Howard Carter and his team on 28th October 1925 in tomb KV62 of Egypt's Valley of the Kings. We saw it later in the cruise.

A huge new museum is under construction near the pyramids and the Tutankhamun exhibits will be housed there. It is due to be completed in 2022; later than originally planned as tourism dropped from 14 million to 2 million, so revenue has dropped as well. Tourism is on the rise and is now around 10 million. The current museum is rather like a glorified store room.

The Nile cruise was excellent with good food and stops along the way to disembark to view temples. We flew from Aswan to Abu Simbel where the airport was built specially to accommodate tourists. We stayed for two hours before flying back! These Temples were dismantled, raised and reassembled from 1964 - 1968 by a team of archaeologists, engineers and skilled heavy equipment operators who worked together under UNESCO. The original site would have been under water once Lake Nasser rose following the construction of Aswan High Dam.

Finally, we flew from Aswan to Cairo with more sightseeing before flying Royal Jordanian Airways to Amman. Wadi Rum and a night in a Bedouin camp was truly remarkable as was Petra where we spent eight hours walking. I went with the others to the Monastery at the far end, up 850 steps, and what goes up has to come down (which was easier than I thought). Being the oldest in the group I got a round of applause when I arrived at the top! Anna did not attempt to go up and found the walking far too much so it was not her best experience. I turned my ankle, on the flat, so rested for a while once back at the hotel. Took a pain killer and then had some of Anna's rum and coke so was completely pain free when we went down for dinner and had my leg pulled about rum being the cure! (Nothing to do with the rum of Wadi Rum!)

Another experience was swimming in the Dead Sea. We did not know what to expect. It was warm and clear and the water seemed to have a slight oily texture and of course we floated. Showered to get the salt off and then swam in the large pool.

It was a very good trip but as always touring can be very tiring - you have to be fit to be a tourist! Early starts were good to allow us to get ahead of the crowds, especially at Petra, and also to avoid the heat of the day.


We had been warned of the dirt and overwhelming numbers of people especially in Cairo and also that the Pyramids were overrun with tourists, large coaches and local hawkers. In spite of this we found the whole Giza experience lived up to our expectations. It is amazing that these vast edifices have survived in such good condition. The construction of the pyramids and tombs is awe inspiring. It was so interesting to be immersed in the ancient history of this region and the customs of that time.

The Nile Cruise was a most enjoyable part of the tour and the short return flight to Abu Simbel was something not to be missed.

In Jordan Petra was the highlight though the experiences of Wadi Rum and the Bedouin Camp were memorable.

Anna flew back to the UK for nine days and then down to Johannesburg for her annual month of November in the sun!

One of the subjects that often comes up when Evergreeners meet, is how many nationalities live here at Evergreen Broadacres.

The other one is, are there more of our children living in other countries than in South Africa?

In order to solve this, I decided to do a survey among the Residents, whilst selling tickets for the 100+ Club Draw. Out of the 130 units at Broadacres I surveyed 122. The balance of units could not be surveyed as a result of the owners having passed away, moved to the Care Centre, moved to stay with children or gone overseas for long periods.

Of the 122 units the following are the results:

69 units occupied by couples

44 units occupied by single females

9 units occupied by single males

A total of 191 people.

You might like to know what has happened to the plastic bread tags and bottle tops you have been collecting for what seems to be ever!

'Bread Tags for Wheelchairs' started in 2006 and enough plastic was collected by 2008 for the first wheelchair.

Now - enough is collected countrywide for nearly 75 wheelchairs per year It takes 450kg bottle tops or 50kg bread tags to Help Fund a Wheelchair.

A new player has also started called 'Sweethearts' running since 2013. They have collected 43.3 tons of bottle tops and 5.9 tons of bread tags enough for 294 wheelchairs.

What amazes me that at our Evergreen recycling area, I still see bottles with tops on and I ask you to have a care and save these scrap pieces of plastic and put them in the container in the library or if you can't do it give them to a friend. Maybe, you will be the one to make a difference?


