DRAKENSBERG BIRDING - SEPTEMBER 2018 from Robin Davey, with brilliant photos from Wally.

Wally and I visited the Champagne area of the Drakensberg, staying at the Drakensberg Sun Timeshare with the purpose of photographing the elusive White Starred Robin which can be seen on the hotel forest walk up to the waterfall. A couple of years ago in September we had previously seen the Robin but not managed to get pics. This bird frequents dark damp forests where it flits about silently and lands temptingly onto a branch for one second at a time. Very frustrating. It has a beautiful call although we have seldom heard it call. Difficult to see let alone get a shot. No joy after four hours on our first morning, but incredible opportunity the next day. Pretty brief view, but my photographer totally nailed it, making his quality controller very happy!



So next morning having accomplished our Robin mission, we decided to go up to the Champagne Castle Camp and Caravan Site. We parked on the tarred parking area where there is not a blade of grass within sight, and climbed out of the car to the nearby call of a Cape Grassbird.



There he was perched low on a scrubby bush on the edge of the tar. Wally snapped away, and then for an hour or two we walked round the campsite, hoping for a view of Barrett's Warbler which we had previously seen there, but without luck this time.

Finally on our way back past reception, we found the Cape Grassbird again calling away, this time from a lichen covered dead tree right next to our pathway. Perfect photo op, and while Wally was taking his pics, we heard another call which we well remembered from our visits to Verlorenkloof. A pair of Lazy Cisticolas thinking about making whoopee. The second perfect photo



opportunity, and we came home well satisfied with our efforts.

Taking the Drakensburg Sun forest walk to the waterfall is a must for anyone visiting the Champagne Castle area of the Drakensberg. One doesn't have to stay at the hotel or timeshare. Pop in for coffee or breakfast and take yourselves on the walk. It is an awesome birding experience.

Dick and Kiloran's trip to Kaapse Hoop:

In an attempt to investigate an astronomical and historical riddle, we were obliged to base ourselves on the edge of the Eastern escarpment in Mpumalanga at Kaapse Hoop (Cape Hope). We stayed in the delightful Kaapse Hoop Gastehuis owned by Ria and Neels Bothma who appeared to follow the eccentric esoteric vibe, although tilting towards the more conservative excesses, that this beautiful but unnerving little town dishes up in bucket loads.

The little town has a number of unusual attractions; The Blue Swallow Reserve, the Kaapse Hoop wild horses that roam the town feely, the lichen covered sandstone and more recently Adams Calendar with its weird and intriguing collection of rocks. The place is inhabited with a surprising selection of artistic, maverick and nonconformist characters.

The day we arrived it was bitterly cold and the whole place was covered in a thick mist which was a major contributor to the eerie feel about the place.

The town was established as a gold camp in 1884 by alluvial gold diggers and was called Die Duivels Kantoor (The Devils Office), no doubt as a consequence of the shenanigans of those early pioneer types. Today it appears to be fighting off development that could increase the allure of the place which is already happening. Our guesthouse owners are passionately conservative and pooh-poohed all the recognized explanations of where Kaapse Hoop's name came from or the origin of the wild horses. The guesthouse has an abundance of books and photographs which we were at liberty to consult.

In 1912 Pom Pom Peacock found the largest single nugget of gold yet discovered at 5.1kg. He subsequently died and his widow wrapped it up in a piece of thick material and used it as a doorstop for 2 years before selling it.

The origin of the wild horses is still a mystery although one theory was that they had been abandoned after the Boer War. I asked Neels who dismissed all the stories as fables. He was adamant that a farmer just abandoned them?





The Magic Adams Calendar Circle, consists of rocks - huge carved boulders - formed roughly in a circle , marking points of the compass. Three of these monoliths could be lined up with Orion's Belt, but only as it's layout 75 000 years ago. This place is intriguing and can no longer be a dot on a map. It needs serious investigation which will take far longer than a weekend visit.






PICTURE COMPETITION

Cesco's at the German Country Club in Paulshof, 131 Holkam Rd.

Dick and I had Prawns and Salmon, both of which were really good and I will definitely repeat the Norwegian salmon I had. The prices too are very reasonable. The setting overlooks the gardens and the tennis courts.

Their pensioner's Menu is open Tuesday to Friday with a choice of 4 options, Fish and chips, Curry Wurst, Pork Trinchado and Grilled chicken breast all of which are R45 not bad. If you add a glass of wine or a cold drink it will set you back a whopping R15.

The food is not fancy but very well done, tasty with what appeared as a nice selection of veggies and the service we experienced was excellent.

Latest news from the UK Minister of Defence

The Royal Navy is proud to announce its new fleet of Type 45 destroyers.

Having initially named the first two ships HMS Daring and HMS Dauntless, the Naming Committee has, after intensive pressure from the European Union in Brussels, renamed them HMS Cautious and HMS

The next five ships are to be HMS Empathy, HMS Circumspect, HMS Nervous, HMS Timorous and HMS Apologist.

Costing £850 million each, they comply with the very latest employment, equality, health & safety and human rights laws. The Royal Navy fully expects any future enemy to be jolly decent and to comply with the same high standards of behaviour.

The new user-friendly crow's nest has excellent wheelchair access. 
