FROM CHAIRMAN HENNIE

July 2020. Dear fellow residents,

So the COVID virus has found its way into our village. First was the un-named resident, then Thola Kasi, one of our duty managers and then Mary Ann Brews. The first resident had to be hospitalised but is out of high care and recovering well; Thola self-isolated at home and will be back at work shortly; Mary Ann is still very uncomfortable from her back operation but is well over her COVID infection, but must still remain in isolation. All good news stories, but they are the lucky ones!

The media abounds with personal testimonies from people who have survived who describe COVID 19 as the worst and most uncomfortable experience they've ever had. While we'll never hear the testimonies of those that didn't survive, their families and friends are feeling the pain so please take care. The restrictions that the state has imposed on us are for our own good and the restrictions that management is imposing on our friends and family members from entering the village are all there to protect us. Please be understanding of its actions and discourage friends and family from even attempting to visit.

Sue Jackson and Judy Stuart came up with the kind thought to send some chocolates to Thola. That turned out to be easier said than done. Kate van Rooyen, one of our Hospitality portfolio leaders couldn't find anybody that would deliver to Soweto. Not to be put-off, she asked around and eventually managed to organise a gift voucher through Checkers - well done Kate for persevering!

And Kate again: a while back she appealed to residents to buy 1 or 2 or more extra loaves of bread and to drop them off at her house. The response in the first month was excellent and more than 90 loaves of bread were delivered to her door. The bread endsup in a soup kitchen in Diepsloot that feeds 500 people 3 times a week. Contributions have flagged in the past month, perhaps because of the Mandela initiative so this is as much a report on Kate's initiative as a reminder to residents to buy that extra loaf or two!

Heather Allan, the other Hospitality portfolio leader hasn't been idle either! She has continued with her initiative to get residents out to attend to the pavement gardens and during this month has organised 2 work-days and the Heron drive pavements have benefited. There are many more pavements and areas that need attention, so please respond positively on future work-days, enjoy a morning out in sun and the opportunity to make a positive contribution to our village.

Thank you, Kate and Heather, it's nice to see that when there aren't any social activities to organise, you haven't been sitting on your hands - well done!

In June, Dave Bromfield informed you that the Waterhole club had been wound-up and put into cold storage until the lockdown restrictions were lifted. Most tokens have been exchanged for stock, or redeemed for cash.

In July Dave closed off the accounts and handed them to ResCom's Finance portfolio leader to be included in our annual financial report. Those accounts showed that since its inception in November 2018, the Waterhole club has contributed R14 000 to ResCom funds!

Isn't that just the most wonderful achievement! And what a painless and enjoyable way of collecting funds! Thank you, Dave Bromfield, and Dave Nesbitt for giving up so much of your time to manage and operate the Waterhole and for preparing those well-loved roasted peanuts and boerie rolls. And to all its members, thank you for all your hard work to raise those funds! We look forward to the restrictions being lifted and the members once more being allowed to gather around the Waterhole.


COVID 19 progression in S.A.

At the end of May, a team from UCT published predictions on the progress of COVID 19 in S.A. It's headline prediction was that by the end of November there would have been 40 000 deaths - a frighting figure that seemed unbelievable at the time. It also published the following projections of active symptomatic cases:

Note: active cases = total infections - minus recoveries - minus deaths.

As far as I'm aware the government has based its planning on these and subsequent predictions that I haven't seen.



The actual statistics published on 27 July plus my projections to 31 July are:

	27 July	31 July
Total cases:	452 525	490 000
Recoveries	274 925	292 500 = 60% of total cases
Deaths	7 067	7 500 = 4% of active cases
Active cases	170 537	190 000 = 39% Of total cases.

Comparing my projection to 31 July with the the curve you'll note that S.A. is almost exactly tracking the 'Optimistic' curve. That curve peaks in August with a total of nearly 1 000 000 active cases.

Projecting the deaths at 4% of the active cases will give total deaths at the peak of 40 000. So total deaths at the end of November will be many more than the originally predicted 40 000!

What conclusions can we draw from this? Simply that things are going to get a lot worse before they start getting better, and that's not going to happen soon! Also, the end outcome in terms of deaths could well be a lot worse than originally predicted.

So again my message is: be patient and very, very careful!





 - (c) How old will Mary be when her father is 10 times as old as Mary was 6 years ago?


