This month, August 2021, approximately 74 items were donated to the Baragwanath Hospital Comfort Committee (BHCC). These included jerseys, beanies and toys for babies, and scarves and fiddlemuffs for adults. BHCC is a charity group run by volunteers. They make up 'comfort' packs that include toiletries and warm clothes. These are given to mothers when they bring their babies into the clinics for vaccinations and health checks.

The group meets on a Monday morning, 10am to noon, in the Clubhouse and all are welcome. While many of us continue to knit at home, it is only during these meetings that we can exchange ideas and learn from each other. Many of us had never knitted for years before coming to Evergreen but the warmth and friendship extended here motivates and stimulates one to explore new avenues.



NEW CHANGES FOR DRIVERS LICENCES

Here are some of the major changes:

- The establishment of more Driving Licence Testing Centres (DLTCs);
- The introduction of mobile centres and kiosks at busy centres
- Extended operating hours for DLTCs
- The ability of DLTCs to accept online payments
- The submission of eye tests by optometrists directly to NaTIS.

It was also announced that the validity of licences that expired between 26 March and 31 August 2021 will now be extended to 31 March 2022.

Improvements for Gautena

Considering that Gauteng poses the biggest challenge due to the large population of motorists and the fact that it remains the only province that has extensively deployed the online booking system, specific actions have been identified to tackle challenges specific to the province.

"In addition to the interventions the province and the Road Traffic Management Corporation (RTMC) are making in arresting the corruption that has bedevilled the system, additional capacity will be added through the opening of two Driving Licence Testing Centres operated by the RTMC at Waterfall Park in Midrand and Eco Park in Centurion.

"These two centres will open their doors on 1 October 2021 and will operate seven days a week, from 07h00 to 21h00. The operationalisation of these centres will add 35,380 renewal slots per month and increase Gauteng capacity for renewal slots by 48%,"

EVERGREEN GRASSHOPPERS-OUR STORY

My Memories of Glenwood High

by Dick Sheppard. Grasshopper #1--1941-1944

My four years at Glenwood were during World War2, a period of restrictions such as blackouts and rationing of petrol. More importantly on the education front several male teachers who enlisted to serve in the armed forces were replace by female teachers. I recall Mrs. Newton-Parry who taught geography and another was a Miss Dix. Head master, J.H. (Froggy) Snow, had come out of retirement to fill the gap of a volunteer who had sign up for the war effort.

Tests were regular on a three-weekly basis, the results of which were announced by the Head Master at morning assembly when freshers (first year boys) sat on the floor in the front rows of the assembly hall. On the occasion of the first test's results 'Froggy' called out 'Sheppard stand up'. He then announced I had scored the highest marks ever in a test and ended with the comment 'Well done. Keep up the good work.' And that was the trigger to maintain the top position throughout my four years. After 2 years at the helm 'Froggy' eventually retired and D.H.(Dave) Lang succeeded him.

Cricket was the dominant sport, Glenwood team being unbeaten in my four years - no wonder with players like John Watkins, the Markham brothers and Mervyn Lang. My sporting contribution was in house teams and I did run the school marathon each year - the course took us past Durban Girls High!! For two years I was an active member of the debating society along with classmate Ray Swart, and we ended with the satisfaction of being the only team to beat Sastri College -the topic War is Inevitable. Cadets was very much part of school activity under the guidance and command of Captain L.W. Dwyer. It must have been my enthusiasm that led to promotion to Corporal, then I completed an officer's course at the Ladysmith infantry camp of the South African Defence Force, returning as Sergeant -Major of Company C.

After leaving Glenwood I continued studies part time, and in 1951 took a job transfer to Johannesburg which led to a near fifty years career with an American-based multinational Company in the metal packaging industry, rising through the ranks to CEO for sub-Saharan Africa.

I retired in 1995.

Bank Fraud Alert

FNB is urging customers to use trusted and secure merchants to avoid being defrauded by merchant fraudsters when shopping online, amid an increase in e-commerce activity brought on by the Covid-19 pandemic the bank has seen a rise in a new fraud modus operandi targeting unsuspecting online shoppers in recent months.

The latest modus operandi involves 'enumeration' and 'account testing', where online merchant fraudsters use automated scripts or software to attempt transactions or payments.

To help minimise the risk of fraud, consumers should use trusted websites for online shopping.

Consumers could identify the security of a website through 'https' or the padlock icon on the Uniform Resource Locator (URL) at the top of the page.

Below FNB shared additional safety tips that consumers should practice to protect themselves and their card details against fraudsters:

- When shopping online, do not click on links in emails or 3rd party websites; rather, type in the website address yourself.
- Never disclose personal information such as passwords and PINs to anyone.
- The bank will never ask you to process a transaction to reverse fraud.
- The bank will never ask you for your OTP or confidential information, such as your banking password.
- Check your bank statement regularly and thoroughly for any unauthorised transactions/withdrawals.
- Use up-to-date software to perform regular anti-virus and malware scans on your personal devices.
- Never send e-mails that contain your account number, card number, and expiry date.
- Use a secure connection and avoid public Wi-Fi.
- Only enter card details when finalising the purchase.

"We advise consumers to familiarise themselves with the new ways that criminals are using to defraud unsuspecting victims. More importantly, we urge consumers always to protect their personal information and to use any of our banking interfaces to report any suspicious transactions on their bank accounts immediately."

Between the two of us, we had gotten hold of the Roadside Assist & the insurance company to report the accident and to ask if Malcolm and FIRSTHELP were on their panel and were allowed to tow me. Sadly they were not but another towing company were on their way! No, no, I yelped. If Malcolm couldnt tow my vehicle I would drive it myself to the Assessment Centre in Selby! I told Malcolm very sadly that I couldn't use him but that wonderful guy said I was not to worry but that he would stay with me until the other tow truck arrived! Wasn't that good of him? A few minutes later, they phoned back to tell me that i could use FIRSTHELP after all. Here is another lesson coming up! Never let anyone tow your vehicle even if they tell you they are certified to do so. As Buckingham Palace said recently, "facts vary" or words to that effect! Get proof from your insurance company first.

The next thing to do was to work out how Jenny & I were going to get from Linksfield to Kengies/Fourways. Uber was the obvious answer. But no! Wonderful Malcolm said he would take us!! Doing my grocery shopping perhaps?! Into Evergreen we came and right up and to my door! All this time he had had his twin brother in the cab of the truck. We thought him a rather taciturn type of a character and were amazed that he didn't even help couple the car to the truck. I Whatsapped Malcolm to thank him for all he had done and when he replied, he sent me the obituary notice & told me that his brother had lost his beautiful daughter to COVID 5 days previously and not only that, her husband plus her mother-in-law and father-in-law had all died of this vicious disease leaving only a tiny 5 month old baby alive! Malcolm himself had lost his pretty daughter last year. So sad that a family has had so many deaths of young people in a relatively short period.

But life goes on and remember, if you are planning an accident in future, do have it in the Linksfield area! Malcolm and his towtruck will be waiting for you!

A new sign posted at Norway's river border with Russia reminds tourists feeling nature's call that it's against the law to pee in the direction of Russia - on pain of a hefty fine.

The sign posted on the banks of the Jakobselva river that separates Norway from Russia reads:

'No Peeing Towards Russia'.

It is placed next to an official signpost informing people that the area is under video surveillance by Norwegian border guards.

Those caught face a fine of 3,000 kroner (290 euros, \$340).

The area is popular with tourists on the Norwegian side, where you can easily see Russia just a few metres away across the river.

A Norwegian law prohibits 'offensive behaviour at the border intended for the neighbouring state or its authorities.'

Norway's 197.7-kilometre land border with Russia is NATO's northern border in the Arctic.

Oslo and Moscow have traditionally enjoyed good relations, though tensions have risen since Russia's 2014 invasion of the Crimean peninsula.
