Thursday the 30th of November at 17:30.





RED PLANET DAY

This day recognises the planet which has captivated human observers for countless years, Mars. Right now, we know that Mars is red thanks to photographs beamed back to Earth from American Rovers. For centuries, the naked human eye has been able to detect the reddish tinge of the solar system's fourth planet, glimmering in the sky. Little did scientists know, the red on Mar's surface came from a preponderance of iron oxide, common rust. On Red Planet Day, we celebrate our fascination with Mars, along with all of the scientific advancements into understanding the dusty planet.

One big question was whether Mars held good old fashioned water, the source of any life on a planet. Flyby missions detected polar ice caps. Ancient 'canals' were shown to be an optical illusion, but that didn't stop many believers from presuming that there had previously been civilisations on the fourth planet from the sun.

Even though Mars has only 15% of the Earth's volume and just over 10% of the Earth's mass, around two thirds of the Earth's surface is covered in water, Mars surface gravity is only 37% of the Earth's, meaning you could leap nearly three times higher on Mars.
