#### CLASSICAL CORNER by Peter Lever



This week I am giving you some "local" interest as well as a chance to view great talent and hear fine music. **Steven de Groote** (1953 – 1989) was probably the finest pianistic talent produced from South Africa – he died tragically young whilst at the peak of his fame. Trained in Cape Town under Lamar Crowson who was, himself, an excellent concert pianist in his day, Steven secured a place at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia where he studied from 1972 to 1975 receiving lessons from the great Rudolf Serkin (who only accepted the finest talent). In 1977 he won the famous Van Cliburn piano competition which guaranteed him a successful concert career.

# **Ingredients**

- 1 cup soft butter
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2tsp vanilla extract
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 2 tsp hot water
- ½ tsp salt
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 cups chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped walnuts



#### **CHOC CHIP COOKIES** - Method

Preheat oven to 175 degrees C.

Cream together the butter, white sugar, and brown sugar until smooth.

Beat in the eggs one at a time, then stir in the vanilla. Dissolve baking soda in hot water. Add to batter along with salt. Stir in flour, chocolate chips, and nuts. Drop large spoonful's onto ungreased pans. Bake for about 10 minutes in the preheated oven, or until edges are nicely browned.

# NATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY - 9th August

The holiday commemorates the national march of women on this day in 1956 to petition against legislation that required African persons to carry the 'pass'. The 'pass' was an identification document which restricted a black South African's freedom of movement under apartheid. The 'pass' had come into force under the Urban Areas Act (commonly known as the

pass laws) of 1950. On August 9th 1956, 20,000 women staged a march to the Union Buildings in Pretoria to protest against proposed amendments to the act. They left petitions containing more than 100,000 signatures at prime minister J.G. Strijdom's office door. They stood silently outside his door for 30 minutes. The women then sang a protest song that was composed in honour of the occasion: Wathint'Abafazi Wathint'imbokodo! (Now you have touched the women, you have struck a rock)




#### IS HISTORY REPEATING ITSELF?
