


CLASSIC MONDAY - RIEN VELVIS

Scent of a Woman is a 1992 American drama film that tells the story of prep school teen Charlie who takes a job caring for Frank "The Colonel" Slade over Thanksgiving holiday to make some money to buy a ticket home for Christmas. The Colonel is a mean, angry, sarcastic man, nursing his self-pity, drinking Jack Daniels like it's water and lives in his niece's converted garage because his other relatives can't stand him. Charlie wants to back out of the job as soon as he meets the cantankerous man, but he's too nice to say no to the colonel's harried niece who obviously needs a vacation. A tough, aging ex-military man, the colonel no longer has control of his life due to blindness. Charlie has his own problems. He's witnessed his bratty "friends" committing a prank damaging the headmaster's Jaguar and after the holidays he'll be forced to rat on them, accept a bribe from an authority figure, or be expelled.

Charlie's life-changing adventure begins when the colonel drags him to New York City for a weekend of indulgences, after which, the colonel declares to his young caretaker, "I will blow my brains out with a gun." As the weekend wears on, Charlie and the colonel slowly come to understand each other. Charlie talks Frank out of his suicide attempt and when they return Frank chooses Charlie's side on the disciplinary hearing.

The film stars Al Pacino and Chris O'Donnell, with James Rebhorn, Philip Seymour Hoffman, Gabrielle Anwar and Bradley Whitford in supporting roles.
Pacino won the Academy Award for Best Actor for his performance. The film won three Golden Globe Awards, for Best Screenplay, Best Actor, and Best Motion Picture – Drama.



Pacino painstakingly researched his part in Scent of a Woman. To understand what it feels like to be blind, he met clients of New York's Associated Blind, being particularly interested in accounts by those who had lost their sight due to trauma. They traced the entire progression for him; from the moment when they knew that they would never see again to the depression and through to acceptance and adjustment. They also schooled him in techniques that a vision impaired person might use to find a chair and seat themselves, pour liquid from a bottle, or light a cigar.

RECENT EVENTS - MELLASAT VINEYARD - DEREK BROWN

A warm sunny day set the scene for our first December outing, revisiting the small vineyard of Mellasat, nestling under the Klein Drakenstein mountains. We opted to enjoy our tasting indoors rather than risk the sunshine on the terrace and settled in for a broad range of wines to taste. Mellasat Vineyards was created by the Richardson family in 1996 from the original farm Dekkersvlei which was established in 1693.

It is located near Paarl, in the heart of South Africa's famous winelands just 45 minutes from Cape Town. The vineyard enjoys a spectacular position under the dramatic Klein Drakenstein mountains and panoramic views of the Paarl and its famous granite domes. We began our tasting with the unwooded Chenin Blanc, a light and fragrant example, followed by the 2019 Viognier, with some depth of flavour and sharp acidity. Next came the 2023 Shiraz Rose, uncharacteristically full-bodied and very amenable!

On to the red wines, beginning with the Revelation, a blend of Shiraz and Cabernet Sauvignon, surprisingly medium-bodied, before taking a step upwards into the Tempranillo, an unusual grape varietal in South Africa, this example a non-vintage, matured in a combination of American and French oak barrels and producing a robust, serious wine, with hints of cherries and berry fruits and lingering tannins on the finish.







Finally, we tried the 2017 Cabernet Sauvignon, the range's flagship, and a lovely, full-bodied, and rounded wine to enjoy. We had lunch at Mellasat, with prepared platters of cheese and/or charcuterie to end our visit.

A change in ownership, a new winemaker; smaller than average tasting portions, limited information about the vineyard, winemaking, and wines, and the disappointment of having no White Pinotage available for us to sample ensured that this was unlikely to be one of our more memorable wine-tasting experiences. However, we still enjoyed a lovely day out, enjoyed each other's company, and ate and drank well!

EVERGREEN WELCOMES - ANITA HEYSTEK - 10 PEROUGES STREET BY ESTELLE COUSTAS

Anita moved into her home in Perouges Street 3 years ago, from the Somerset Lifestyle & Retirement Village in Somerset West, where she had lived for 6 years. Shortly before she moved she needed major orthopaedic surgery so her eldest daughter came down from Windhoek to manage her move, and it was quite some time before Anita was ready to integrate into Val de Vie Evergreen.

Born in Johannesburg and schooled in Tzaneen, Anita's formal study of Fine Art kicked off at the Pretoria Technikon, but after a year's study there her dad persuaded her to go off and do something to train herself for a "proper job" where she would be able to make a living. She kept her creative side alive by sketching and attending pottery classes while she lived in Pretoria for 40 years, married and raised their family of 2 daughters (her second daughter has recently returned to South Africa after living in the UAE) and a son who lives in Switzerland.

Very sadly, in 1993 Anita's husband passed away at a relatively young age after a terminal illness, and during the time that he was ill he encouraged her to pursue her Art dream once she no longer needed to care for him. And so it was that she registered at the Open Window Art Academy in Pretoria, and completed her 3-year Fine Arts diploma as a full-time student, a decision she has never regretted as it acted as therapy, and it was so liberating and fulfilling to achieve a lifetime aspiration at a mature age.

After Anita's children vacated the nest, she moved to Swakopmund in Namibia, where she lived for 13 years (before her move to Somerset West) - there she had had her first art exhibition while still living in South Africa, won various competitions and completed commissions like a large triptych for The Namibia Diamond Trading Company.



Anita's art can be described as
Contemporary/Surrealism with recognisable
objects depicting her experiences/views and
issues of the world around her. She loves the art
process which keeps her mind stimulated, with
her always thinking and making decisions as
part of her thought processes. The artwork
currently on her easel, in the photograph
attached, illustrates this approach. Selling her art
is a bonus, but it's certainly not her main aim.
Anita loves living in Val de Vie Evergreen, not
only in her own private space with her garden,
the birds and bees, but also surrounded by
lovely neighbours, the wider community and
good healthcare when she needs it.

EVERGREEN WELCOMES HEILNA DU PLOOY - 1 MENERBES STREET WRITTEN BY ESTELLE COUSTAS

Heilna moved into her home in Menerbes Street in September, from Jeffreys Bay. where she and her late husband of 54 years, Dries, who passed away in May this year. had lived for the last 6 years. Prior to their decision to move to what was their holiday home in Jeffreys Bay for many years, Heilna and Dries lived in Potchefstroom for 32 years, both teaching at the university where Dries was the Dean of Theology and Heilna the Professor of Afrikaans en Nederlands and Literary Theory, finally retiring as an Extraordinary Professor at the end of 2023. Heilna looks back on a life enriched by not only her work including teaching and research, but also extensive travel to foreign countries to present at conferences, attend meetings and accompany her husband on his business trips through his work with the Association of Commonwealth Universities. and his position as Director and Head of the Greenwich School of Theology in latter years.

In addition to her work in academia, Heilna is an artist (oils and water colours) and an author of numerous literary works, including short stories, a novel and 4 volumes of poetry. She also serves on various Literary Advisory committees, including a committee tasked with a new Afrikaans translation of the Bible (the 2020 Direkte vertaling). As with many other Val de Vie Evergreen residents, Heilna's children are spread across the globe (her youngest of 3 sons lives in New Zealand with his family and the other 2 in Pretoria) and her daughter, Jannet, is closest (and responsible for her mother moving to Val de Vie when there was no suitable retirement property in Hout Bay where Jannet lives with her family). Heilna looks forward to settling in her new home, with her little dog, Patroon, who has been part of the family for 8 years.

NEW TRADITIONS - PIT JOUBERT

Any society, however small, develops traditions without even knowing they do. More often than not and with the passing of time, the origin of these traditions are shrouded in obscurity. A recent case in point is the closing of the Wilgenhof residence at the University of Stellenbosch because some of it's traditions, probably dating back more than 150 years, were found to be offensive.

Traditions play an important part in the lives of people to give them a sense of belonging to a society and serve as a form of security in an ever changing world. I remember a movie I enjoyed many years ago called Fiddler on the Roof about the traditions of the Russian Jewish people to which they cling despite all the adversites they faced. One of the songs in this musical, sung by Tevye, the main character, and called 'Traditions' exhorts the villagers to remember and cherish their traditions as their world crumbles around them and they are forced to leave their village.

We are the first generation of residents here at Val de Vie, Evergreen, and without even knowing it we have started traditions that will no doubt still be followed many decades from now. A good example is Deborah's walking group called Walk Mont, and named after Montresor Street and not a mountain like the name Mont would suggest. During Covid the Montresor Rebels started to walk in the mornings to avoid the strict lockdown regulations and later other walkers joined. We started to record the distances we walk and mapped a route from Val de Vie to Cairo in Egypt. As at the end of this year we have recorded 3350 km and are only 6700 km from Cairo. I can just imagine how in fifty years from now retirees will be wondering why they are mapping out their walks in places all over the world.





Cheese Cake - Solomons family

PASTRY

(I use this pastry for all my baked tarts - easy & delicious)

SHORTBREAD PASTRY

- 1 good cup Flour
- 3 TBS Castor sugar
- ½ tsp Baking powder
- Pinch salt

Mix together, and add 125g melted butter (NOT margarine!) to bind, and press into your pie dish.

FILLING

I just throw all ingredients into my Magimix & mix till blended...do not over-blend or cream cheese "breaks down" and gets too runny.

- 2 well-beaten Eggs
- 1 tsp Custard powder (dissolved in a little milk)
- ½ cup Sugar
- 1 cup Thick cream
- ½ tsp Vanilla
- · 2 tubs Cream cheese

Pour filling into lined pie dish and bake 190deg C for 25-30 mins (can leave a little longer if want it firmer, depends on your oven).

Leave to settle on a cooling rack before cutting. Serve warm or cold.


I also sometimes make in a slightly deeper dish and make one-and-a-half-times the recipe, as then you get a nice thick filling, but then also make a bit more of the pastry.

Recently, Lesley taught me how to make her "pickles", she showed me her treasured recipe book and I asked her to share the story...

The Story of my Granny's recipes...

"My recipe book no longer has a cover but it was put together by a group of charitable ladies, including my Granny Rosie, in 1949 to raise funds to donate to the underprivileged. They each contributed their "special" recipes and had the printing sponsored in Port Elizabeth. It sold really well and was reprinted a number of times to meet the demand. A treasured little book in many a household."


"This is a typical recipe from my Granny ...note the accuracy of the quantity of flour required...I love it, but this is how I was taught to cook as a little girl!"



METHOD: Roll out into baigel and boil for 2 mins. in boiling water. Bake in hot oven 450 or 475° till golden brown.


PAELLA for AFRICA: Special Recipe



This recipe for Spanish paella (pronounced "pa-ay-ya") was brought to South Africa in the 1960's by a Spanish relative, passed on lovingly and amended slightly over the years to cater for South African tastes. It is ideally meant to be cooked in a genuine paellero (round, shallow steel pan with side handles) on an open fire, for the ultimate gastronomic and socially enjoyable experience.

Ingredients (for 6): ** indicates optional

- Tsp olive oil (or vegetable oil if needs be)
- 6 chicken thighs (cut into 12 portions)
- **1 pkt streaky bacon (cut into 1 cm wide strips) (or chorizo sausage)
- 1 large onion; or 2 medium/small ones (chopped)
- 1 green pepper (cut into thin short strips) (or green/red pepper combo)
- 2 cups Tastic rice (1/3 cup of rice per person); 2 ripe tomatoes, diced
- 1.5 Telma (or other) chicken stock cubes, dissolved in 5 cups boiled water
- Infuse the stock with several strands of saffron (or a generous pinch of turmeric)
- 1 pinch cayenne pepper; 1tsp tomato paste, 1tsp sugar; **1 cup white wine
- S & P seasoning to taste (stock should not be bland)
- 250g calamari rounds/strips
- **12 tiger prawns (in shells) de-veined
- **12 black mussels (scrubbed & debearded) in shell or half-shell
- **12 black olives (or peas or chopped green beans) to decorate
- 4 small cloves garlic (or 2 large ones), finely chopped and mixed with handful fresh chopped parsley to decorate.









Method

Heat generous splash of oil in paella dish (paellero), ideally on open fire or grill over gas, until smoking hot - and brown chicken pieces on 1 side quickly. Add bacon, stir fry briefly; add onion and green pepper, stir fry for about 2 mins, or until onion beginning to brown (& bacon beginning to crisp slightly).

Scatter rice evenly and stir fry briefly; add tomatoes and continue frying for a few minutes only, until rice translucent, turning light brown or beginning to stick.

Immediately pour on just over half the chicken stock evenly.

Ensure chicken pieces are attractively arranged, brown side up.

Quickly add cayenne pepper, immerse tomato paste, sprinkle sugar and pour on white wine; S & P to taste (rice/stock mix should be flavoursome, not bland)

ENSURE PAELLERO IS LEVEL ON FIRE AND DO NOT STIR AGAIN.

Simmer for about 10 mins, then add remaining stock when rice visible but moist. Simmer for another 10 mins or so, then add calamari and press gently onto rice.

After a few minutes, arrange prawns, mussels and olives on top of paella and cook through gently for about 5 mins, until rice tender, separate and fluffy.

Sprinkle chopped parsley and garlic, drizzle 1tsp olive oil over dish.

Cover (with foil or lid or similar), remove from heat and allow to settle for 5 mins.

Place on heat resistant mat or stand in middle of dining table, remove cover and acknowledge gasps of hungry amazement. Provide deep serving spoons and invite diners to delve deeply and tuck in. They will, time and again.


Letters to my Mother. by Kumi Naidoo.

I bought this 'struggle' memoir noticing that Professor Jonathan Jansen said on the cover "I finished this deeply moving gift of a book in one sitting".

Kumi Naidoo, an Indian Durbanite was born in Chatsworth in 1965. He writes a courageous, personal memoir of his activism during the days of Apartheid. It was a call to action in troubled times.

His mother died by suicide when he was only 15 years old, shattering his life. He received much intentional advice but an Uncle gave him wisdom. "My boy, I don't know how you will recover from this, but one thing I do know is that however bad things are for you now, there are people in our country and in the world who are suffering so much more. One way to deal with the loss of your Ma is to live with purpose and work for the dignity of all people".



Thus he began an extraordinary life with over 40 years of being a good troublemaker, reminding us all to make meaningful contributions to humanity.

He became a target of security police surveillance, was detained and he fled into hiding to complete his university exams. Eventually in 1987 at the age of 22 he left South Africa to pursue a Rhodes scholarship at Oxford University.

Kumi Naidoo became a former Secretary General of Amnesty International and a former Director of Green Peace International and remains a global figure with social movements in South Africa and worldwide. Kumi Naidoo took to heart the advice of his Uncle and found a way to live with purpose and work for the dignity of all people.

Letters to my Mother is only half of his memoirs. The sequel is much anticipated.



Astronomy is a bright
spot amid turbulence on
Earth.

An understanding of the world around us and the universe as a whole is something that has made humans what they are today. As a human we are considered a species of primate in the greater understanding of life on Earth. At present humans appear to be the only species on Earth that can reason, compose music, create intentional art and write both fiction and non fiction stories. To be able to project these attributes into an understanding of things even at vast distances and the unseen, appears to be a purely human attribute.

Astronomy since Galileo has made enormous strides in understanding the world around us and the universe. However, the study of space and its often intangible products is queried by the general populace as expensive and unnecessary.

But in fact, astronomy has directly affected peoples lives. The rapid development of computers for satellites and spacecraft is testament to and the subsequent advance of solar power has fast-tracked the solar panel technology we use on Earth. Mobile phones and GPS tracking systems are a direct result of space exploration and the development of CCD cameras. Airport scanners and security



An early view of how the Earth and its surroundings worked.


systems have progressed extensively due to their use in space. Portable X-ray machines and MRI scanners required in space exploration has benefited the medical industry and human health. Furthermore, viewing Earth from space has helped us understand our changing climate and even drawn humans together in appreciating the fragility of our world.

As our large cities and urban centres have developed, light pollution has mushroomed and the stars that we can now see with the unaided human eye in our night skies has diminished substantially. Since 1966 when Pauline and I arrived in South Africa, light pollution in the Johannesburg night sky has increased and the number of stars now visible are substantially less. The human eye can detect 5000 stars in the night sky but with light pollution this is often reduced to a couple of dozen or less. Migratory animals, birds and insects are drawn off their intended paths by the bright lights of urban light pollution. Birds are known to collide with buildings and other structures when confused by the light.

Our ancestors used the rising and setting of the constellations to navigate and even today a rudimentary knowledge is advisable in the advent of technical malfunction. Galileo used the telescope to view and prove many theories about the night sky. As telescopes improved our knowledge of the night sky increased yearly. Space telescopes were an obvious development with the light pollution from Earth far below. The Hubble Space Telescope which orbits the Earth, was launched in 1990 and is one of the major contributors to the rapid expansion of our knowledge of the galaxies, stars and planets. With the launch of the James Webb Space Telescope in 2021, our knowledge has expanded exponentially. Orbiting the Sun JWST, with 50 billion bytes of data being recorded daily is now viewing the edge of the observable universe.



Vera C Rubin Observatory - Chile
Back on Earth, extensive intervention has reduced
light pollution in many areas particularly at high
altitude. The Vera C Rubin Observatory will begin
operation in 2025. Being Earth based at a cost of
\$473 million, it is substantially less than the JWSP
which was an 'astronomical' \$10 billion! What is
equally impressive is that the Rubin Observatory
will collect 20 trillion bytes of raw data per night!



As we age, many of our body parts are not as efficient as they used to be. Our eyes are an extraordinary organ which record information, in many instances without our direct knowledge. Keep them safe and never tire of their ability.






