CLASSIC MONDAY - RIEN VELVIS

After leaving River Dance due to conflicts over creative control, Michael Flatley turned to realising an old dream and put into action a plan of creating a dance show capable of playing in arenas and stadiums instead of traditional theatres.

His Lord of the Dance officially debuted on July 2, 1996, at The Point Theatre in Dublin, Ireland. From Dublin the show went on to a run of four sold-out weeks at the London Coliseum, sold out within days of going on sale in Australia, and broke all known box office records here in South Africa.


America fell under its spell in March 1997, with thirteen consecutive sell-out shows at New York's prestigious Radio City Music Hall. Michael and the troupe delivered a scintillating performance at the 69th Academy Awards Ceremony in Hollywood, before a global television audience estimated at over 2.5 billion. 1998 was another record-breaking year for Lord of the Dance. The show performed 21 consecutive sell-out shows at London's Wembley Arena, a feat for which it still holds the record.

The story, based on ancient Irish folklore, follows Flatley's character, the "Lord of the Dance", and his fight against the evil dark lord Don Dorcha from taking over Planet Ireland. There is a secondary theme of "good girl versus bad girl", or "love versus lust".

The Lord of the Dance defeats the dark lord's invasion with help from a little spirit. This spirit is eternally positive, dancing and beaming at all times.

The show begins with the little spirit playing "The Lord of the Dance" melody, solo, on tin whistle, before the dark forces come and take over the Celts. Michael Flatley was recorded several times in the Guinness Book of World Records; holding the World Record of an incredible 35 taps per second; as the Highest Paid Dancer and having the Highest Insurance Policy on his legs (at \$40,000,000).

2023 saw the show return to Dublin at the Bord Gais Energy Theatre where Michael Flatley and the original cast gathered onstage to celebrate 27 Years of Lord of the Dance.

RECENT EVENTS - WINE TASTING AT UNDER OAKS - KARIN STEGMANN

Established in 1695 as a freehold by Simon van der Stel, Under Oaks Estate stands as one of South Africa's oldest farms, with a history rich in resilience weathering storms, fires, droughts, and floods. The estate is located in northern Paarl, about 30 minutes from Evergreen. It is family-owned (Britz family) and operated. Boutique-style wines are crafted on-site by winemaker Bertus, they offer farm accommodation, and have a welcoming pizzeria known for the quality of their pizzas.

Twenty people from Evergreen set off on a hot summer day for a lovely wine tasting and lunch at Under Oaks on 5 March. Dynamic Sue Green, who has been with the estate for almost 16 years, guided us with flair, knowledge and effortlessness through the tasting in a rustic and cool environment. We tasted the Under Oaks range starting with 2 white - 2023 Chardonnay and 2024 Chenin Blanc, and one Rose (2024) wine. All three these wines are very suitable for our typical warm summer days and evenings. We then moved on to the reds where we tasted a 2018 Pinotage Reserve, 2022 Malbec and maybe the best of all, their 2017 Shiraz Reserve, which received a double gold Michelangelo award. We concluded the enjoyable outing with a very tasty Italian lunch at their pizzeria restaurant. Most of us sat outside in the shade of big trees overlooking a small lake while enjoying one of their highly recommended pizzas, while others tried a pasta dish or salad bowl. All in all, we had a relaxing and enjoyable few hours with lovely wine and food. We appreciate Angela's and Linda's efforts in organising these wine tasting events for us. Thank you!

RECENT EVENTS - WINE TASTING AND LUNCH AT DELHEIM WINES - DEREK BROWN



Another scorching hot, sunny summer's day set the scene for another Evergreen wine tasting adventure, returning once more to a revered favourite venue, Delheim Wines on the outskirts of Stellenbosch.

Delheim is owned by the Sperling family. The late Michael Hans "Spatz" Sperling, was the Patriarch and also a South African wine industry legend. His wife Vera still resides on the farm. Eldest son Victor Sperling and eldest daughter Nora Thiel serve as directors of the company and live on the farm with their families.

The Simonsberg is named after the first Governor of the Cape, Simon van der Stel, after which Stellenbosch is also named. In 1699, he granted the freehold of this piece of land to Lourenz Kamfer, a German. It was originally named De Driesprong. The farm had various owners until Mr Hans Otto Hoheisen bought it in 1938 as a retirement home for himself and his wife Deli. DELHEIM comes from the German for "Deli's home". Sat inside the charismatic cellar, in the cool air-conditioned comfort, we began our tasting with the delightfully fruity 2024 Pinotage Rosé, noting that Delheim were the very first vineyard to produce a Pinotage Rosé, all the way back in 1976.

Following on, we tried the 2024 Wild Fermented Chenin Blanc, created with only natural fermentation to produce a delicious wine of depth and complexity. A very interesting and unusual white wine next, the 2023 Staying Alive Riesling. A nod to Delheim's German heritage, they are keeping alive an excellent example of this noble grape in South Africa, and we enjoyed the dry, distinctive and full-bodied flavour of an under-appreciated varietal.

Also on offer was the 2022 Chardonnay Sur Lie, lightly oaked and left to mature on the lees, producing a beautifullybalanced wine. Reds came next, beginning with the 2023 Pinotage, a classic rendition of this fresh, friuty varietal, then the 2022 blend of Shiraz and Cabernet Sauvignon, nicely rounded and balanced, before finishing off with the 2022 Cabernet Sauvignon, with characteristic deep colour, blackcurrent aromas and long lingering finish. Lunch followed on, fulfilling freshly cooked fare from a varied and interesting menu. Delheim never fails to delight, and we enjoyed yet another excellent day's entertainment amongst wonderful scenery and joyous company.

It has been a lot of fun playing and watching the rounds with thrilling games and unexpected victories!


Notably Renton Trollip who doesn't practice much, did particularly well by knocking out

The two beautiful heavy glass trophies donated by Rothea Olivier were especially imported from Pretoria. We hope to display these trophies in a dedicated corner of our



EVERGREEN WELCOMES PAUL SLEATH AND ALLY LLOYD - 21 PEROUGES STREET- WRITTEN BY ESTELLE COUSTAS

Paul & Ally moved into their new home in Perouges Street recently, from the home which they bought in Franschhoek 7 years ago when they moved to South Africa from Malta, a country which they loved but where they missed the trees and greenery which are totally absent in that part of the world. Their main reason for moving here was to be closer to a wonderful area for walks and meeting more people, and to move away from Franschhoek with the terrible 2023 flood when they were trapped in their house by 1000 m³ of sand surrounding the building, an experience they would prefer not to see a repetition of.

Ally is an ex Rhodesian, who immigrated to Johannesburg in 1990. She worked in the banking industry for most of her life, until she relocated to Prague in 2001, where she lived for 17 years and amongst others taught English to foreign students until she moved to Malta where she met Paul.

Paul was born in the UK and later moved his home to Malta where he invested in 2 seaside properties and lived for 7 years. He worked in the tyre industry his entire life (including interesting projects like, during his employment with Goodyear, being part of the tyre design team for the Formula 1 & 2 motor races). His work life had him travelling extensively and living temporarily in many foreign countries, like Kenya where he was based from 1980 - 1987. He has 2 sons, Andrew, who lives in Oxfordshire in England, and Gregory, who lives in Malta. While Paul and Ally are busy unpacking the treasures gathered over so many years, it is obvious that Paul has invested hours into his hobbies over the years - these include compiling the Sleath family history (there are



1100 Sleaths on between 12 & 15 different family trees as far back as 1650), painting and collecting his grandfather's paintings, of which all 45 are spread between their home and various family members', and collecting classic cars of which he had 10 garaged between his 2 properties in Malta - today he has only 1 left, a classic 1973 Porsche 911 Targa which he shipped to the UK. He also enjoys sport, which has included golf, tennis, tenpin bowling and bowls (which he played at the Franschhoek Bowling Club where he served as the Vice President). He is looking forward to joining the bowls group in our village once they are settled, and Ally plans to join Jane de Villiers's bowls lessons for beginners, as well as learning to play bridge. Although Paul and Ally will miss living in Franschhoek next to Paul's sister, they know that they have made the right decision in relocating, and are enjoying all the facilities which Val de Vie have to offer, including the restaurants on the estate where they often pop in for an ale and a light lunch.

EVERGREEN WELCOMES - KOOS AND MAGDA OOSTHUYSEN – 15 PEROUGES STREET - WRITTEN BY KARIN STEGMANN

Koos en Magda Oosthuysen het aan die einde van 2024 hulle intrek in Perougesstraat 15, Evergreen geneem, nadat hulle vir sowat 27 jaar in Johannesburg gewoon het. Hulle het egter altyd graag Kaap toe gekom (so 4 keer per jaar) en wou altyd hier kom aftree. Hulle het die afgelope vyf jaar behoorlik hul huiswerk rondom aftreeoorde hier in die Wes-Kaap gedoen en nadat 'n beplande ontwikkeling in Franschhoek deur die mat geval het, het hulle keuse op Evergreen geval – die feit dat dit binne die groter Val de Vie Estate geleë is, was 'n groot bydraende faktor vir hierdie lewenslustige, dinamiese en energieke egpaar. Magda het in 1981 aan die Vryburger Hoërskool in Germiston gematrikuleer, nadat die gesin tydens haar skoolloopbaan 'n draai deur die Vrystaat (Bothaville) gemaak het. Na een jaar mediese studie aan die UOVS (deesdae University of the Free State - UFS), begin sy by EY (voorheen Ernest & Young) in Johannesburg werk, terwyl sy aandlesings (BCom Rek) studeer het aan die destydse RAU (tans University of Johannesburg – UJ). Na voltooing van haar klerkskap en kwalifisering as geoktrooieerde rekenmeester verlaat sy EY vir die bankwese, meer spesifiek "Investment and Corporate Banking" in 1994. Sy werk steeds in hierdie area en spandeer asulks een week per maand in Sandton, sy kan gelukkig die res van die tyd van die huis af werk.

Koos is gebore in Virginia, Vrystaat, maar verhuis saam met sy gesin na Stilfontein op 8-jarige ouderdom waar hy aan die Hoërskool Stilfontein matrikuleer in 1979. Twee jaar weermagopleiding in Heidelberg volg daarna, alhoewel hy die meeste van hierdie tyd in Namibië gespandeer het. Hy begin by die Buffelsfontein goudmyn in Stilfontein te werk in 1982 en skryf hom in vir ingenieurswese (eers metallurgies en daarna elektries) aan die Wits Technikon. Hy sluit hom egter in 1987 by 'n IT infrastruktuurmaatskappy aan voor die afhandeling van sy studies – hier het hy gewerk (37 jaar in totaal) tot en met sy aftrede as Projekdirekteur aan die einde van 2024. Na 12



jaar het hy 'n aandeelhouer geword in die maatskappy, aandele wat handig te pas gekom het met die koop van hulle huis hier in Evergreen. Die egpaar is in 1992 getroud en het een dogter, Anja (29), wat 'n skrikkeljaarbaba was. Sy woon tans in Rondebosch en is werksaam by Ecolution Consulting, wat fokus op omgewingsvriendelike en volhoubare argitektuur, wat 'n groot passie vir haar is.

Voorts is Magda baie bly en dankbaar dat sy haar ma, wat aan demensie lei en in 'n verswakte sorgeenheid ("frail care") in Pretoria was, kon skuif na die Evergreen Health Health Care Centre, waar sy haar gereeld kan besoek. Koos en Magda het 'n passie vir die lewe en beoog om die omgewing behoorlik te verken en te geniet. Hulle hou van stap, doen graag wynproeë en wil soveel moontlik goeie restaurante (waarvan daar nie 'n tekort hier in die Wes-Kaap is nie) besoek, omdat lekker eet en saamkuier 'n ander groot liefde vir hulle is. Hulle het ook 'n voorliefde vir reis en was al menigmale oorsee. Besoeke aan Italië, veral die platteland, toer al langs Amalfi-kus, en Venesië bly van hul gunstelinge, alhoewel Spanje en Portugal met hul besondere kerke nie ver terugstaan nie. Hulle sien uit na wonderlike jare vol vreugde en nuwe ontdekkings wat vir hulle voorlê hier in Evergreen.

THE CHOCOLATE RABBIT - PIT JOUBERT

I have always been fascinated by the origin of things and how difficult it can be to trace that origin. Take the spoken language for example. It is impossible to determine when human beings developed complex communication but we do know that around 100 000 BCE women started to wear jewellery in the form of beaded seashells. From this simple fact we can determine that about 100 000 years ago Catherine must have been able to tell Johanna, "look what Shirley is doing with seashells, the sanctimonious tart!"

Once our ancestors started to talk they became unstoppable and as the centuries passed different languages evolved. The first alphabet system only originated around 1700 BCE and once that gained traction human beings could set about the impossible task of recording their history of the past 100 centuries.

One of the endearing pieces of our early history involves the goddess Eostre or Ostara who wandered the earth with her precious bird, probably a swallow, in search of spring. She soon realised that her winged companion was not equipped to endure the hardships of the winter cold and transformed the bird into a brisk, quick-footed little quadruped with long ears, a warm furry coat, and no tail to speak of, ready and able to sniff out spring wherever it may be in hiding among the icebergs.

Eostre or Ostara became the goddess of fertility as her arrival proclaimed the beginning of new life and her quadruped companion, the rabbit, the messenger of spring. Once the rabbit had spring sniffed out it turned back into its former bird mode for enough time to lay the gaily coloured eggs that are the symbol of the awakening of earth and the renewal of life.

It is impossible to determine when the legend of the Easter bunny was first told to wide eyed children in a cave somewhere, but because it is such a lovely story, and no doubt involving parents pretending colourful stones were eggs, dates back more than 50 000 years.

As I write this piece chocolate Easter eggs and Easter chocolate bunnies are on sale at basically every shop you care to visit. Cadbury produced the chocolate Easter egg after developing a pure cocoa butter that could be moulded into shapes back in 1875 and is still selling them to this day. In Western cultures and South America the giving of Easter chocolate eggs is commonplace with 80 million Easter eggs sold in the UK alone during Easter. In many cultures the chocolate eggs are hidden for children to search for them, just as children would have searched for the legendary eggs all those many centuries ago.

Legend also has it that no person over the age of 60 can gain weight by eating chocolate during Easter provided that the chocolate is in the form of an Easter egg. So be merry and indulge in Cadbury!





HEALTH MATTERS - PROF JENNY PORTER

Vaccines: shall I, shan't I? Yes? No? Why? Why not?

As winter approaches and the subject of vaccination against the flu virus is discussed, the question of whether or not vaccines are good or bad, continues to rage.

Before I write any further, my disclaimer up front is that I am pro vaccines but will try and give you a (reasonably) unbiased view.


ABOUT VACCINES

Vaccines are responsible for many global public health successes, such as the eradication of smallpox and significant reductions in other serious infections like polio and measles. Even so, vaccinations have also long been the subject of various ethical controversies.

Historically, Edward Jenner, born in England in 1749, is one of the most famous physicians in medical history. He emphasised the importance of observation: really looking and seeing. Jenner tested the hypothesis that infection with cowpox could protect a person from smallpox infection. All vaccines developed since Jenner's time stem from his work. The cowpox vaccine is the same family as smallpox, so Jenner was able to use his experience to start vaccinating local people, then this technique spread all over the world. Smallpox is now successfully eradicated and vaccination against it no longer necessary.

Robert Koch (1843-1910), a German physician who helped establish bacteriology as a science, recognised the steps necessary to identify the cause of a disease. Koch made important discoveries in identifying the bacteria that cause anthrax, cholera, and tuberculosis, at a time when understanding of microbes was just beginning. We are privileged to have Prof. Jenny Porter as a resident, offering her fascinating insights on a variety of medical subjects. Recently, we've seen a surge of medical professionals joining us, so keep an eye out for Dr. Pierre de Villiers, who will be addressing the topic of aging and the brain with a talk in June.

The 1954 field trial of Jonas Salk's inactivated poliovirus vaccine (IPV) was another important milestone in the use of the scientific method to test a vaccine. Many of you reading this will remember having polio vaccines before or at school little drops of medicine on sugar squares. The Salk vaccine trial successfully showed that the vaccine helped prevent paralytic polio, and licensure of the vaccine quickly followed. The disease that once paralyzed thousands of children has now been eliminated in the Western Hemisphere.





The smallpox vaccine was the first vaccine developed. In 10th century China, a form of "vaccination" called variolation, was used to protect against cowpox. The term vaccination is derived from the Latin word for "cow" which is "vacca." In the late 1700s, smallpox was a disease that caused periodic epidemics all over the world, with death rates anywhere from 1% to 30%. While scientists then did not know what caused smallpox, they did know that exposure to a similar disease, cowpox, conferred immunity against smallpox. It wouldn't be until the mid-1800s that Germ Theory began to be adopted as the best way to explain infectious diseases. And it wouldn't be until the 1930s that electron microscopes allowed for the visualization of viruses. (Although the theory of viruses as causative agents of disease was developed in the late 1800s.)

Overall, the development of vaccines is a collaborative effort involving scientists, regulatory agencies, healthcare professionals, and the public. This intricate process ensures that vaccines are not only effective in combating diseases but are also safe for widespread use.

WHAT DO VACCINES DO?

Vaccines are intended to prepare your immune system to fight off infections and prevent disease. They set your body up to be prepared to fight off a specific infection. Vaccines have transformed human health by preventing diseases that once claimed millions of lives. The journey from early inoculation practices to today's cutting-edge mRNA technology is a story of scientific curiosity, collaboration, and innovation. Understanding how different vaccines work helps us appreciate their role in safeguarding ourselves, communities, and in shaping modern medicine. Making vaccines has changed from injecting the live bug (like cowpox) in diluted form, to present day sophisticated virus-genetically manipulated vaccines such as the mRNA vaccine used for Covid. The various methods used to produce vaccines now include attenuated vaccines (weakened lab-grown bugs) cell culture (egg, mammals, human), genetic engineering and nanotechnology (manipulating matter at the atomic, molecular, and supramolecular level). All these aim at producing a more effective and infectionspecific vaccine, with minimum risk to the end user (you and me).


Live attenuated vaccines contain weakened viruses or bacteria that provoke strong immune responses without causing severe illness (polio vaccine)

MMR live viruses are attenuated (weakened: stimulate a protective immune response but cause no or mild disease) through various cell culture processes. These vaccines often confer lifelong immunity with one or two doses. However, they're unsuitable for immunocompromised individuals, as even weakened pathogens pose risks.


Inactivated vaccines use killed pathogens, making them safer for vulnerable populations.

While inactivated vaccines don't provide as durable protection as live ones, they're crucial for diseases like rabies and hepatitis A. For example, the influenza shot—updated annually to match circulating strains—relies on viruses grown in chicken eggs or cell cultures. **Toxoid vaccines** are effective, not against the pathogen, but against the toxins It makes e.g. tetanus and diphtheria. These two are usually administered as a combined vaccination to children as the DTP where P is whooping cough or pertussis (an inactivated virus) vaccine.

And finally, mRNA vaccine is one which uses a process to copy the genetic messenger part of a virus (for example) to produce a foreign protein in a human (you and me) which mimics the virus but is not infective. This sets up our immune system to recognise this "invader" so we can set up an early and effective response against it. It is a quicker process and effective and was used to produce the corona virus vaccine during the COVID epidemic, and since.



SIDE EFFECTS:



WHY SHOULD I HAVE A FLU SHOT?

Firstly, if you are over 65 years of age. Then, to prevent the flu and its complications, reduce the risk of getting sick, and needing hospitalisation, and (especially if you have other risk factors such as asthma, bronchitis, or emphysema) it protects those around you who are vulnerable. Even if you do get sick, vaccination will reduce the severity of the illness.

WHY NOT?

You should not have a vaccine if you are

allergic to any ingredients of the vaccine. If you are allergic to eggs, check that the vaccine you receive is not one with an egg-based manufacturing process. If you have any immune compromise, discuss vaccination with your GP before receiving the injection. If you are acutely ill, it is prudent to wait until you are well before having the vaccination.

A sore arm at the site of injection, low grade fever, and aching muscles may occur. This is merely your body's immune system kicking into gear and doing what it is meant to do. It takes a couple of weeks to set up this immunity, so you will not have full protection until after this time.

You can have the flu and covid shot at the same time, but it will not be in the same injection. The controversial discussion around autism and other potential problems often discussed around vaccines, will not be addressed here, as this is more relevant to the paediatric population.

Other vaccines suggested for senior citizens (especially if you travel a lot) include hepatitis (A,B and C), shingles, pneumovac (against pneumonia), and boosters for MMR and DPT. Once you are 80 years old, discuss your need for vaccines with your GP.

The latest flu vaccines are either eggbased or recombinant/mRNA types. This depends on where in the world you are (USA, UK, SA, China etc) and the vaccine available to you. You cannot get flu from this vaccine as the vaccine does not contain a live virus. If you develop a flu-like illness after the injection, this is coincidence.

Because flu viruses can change quickly, flu vaccines are updated every year. Global flu surveillance information has indicated that, in 2025, the flu vaccine covers 3 main strains, whereas last year there was a tetravalent (4strain). The strains (for those interested) are 2 A strains H1N1, H3N2, and a B strain: Victoria. The B/Yamgata strain has not been detected since 2020, so is not included. In the USA, the quadrivalent vaccine is available. I am not yet sure which one we will receive here. WHO has recommended the trivalent one for all countries in 2025.

The flu vaccine does not protect you from the corona virus (SARS-C0V-2) of COVID.

A FINAL WORD ABOUT VACCINES

The decades-old theory that dementia could be triggered by a virus, received publicity last year (2024) when several scientific groups published findings that people who had been vaccinated against shingles were less likely to develop dementia than their unvaccinated peers. This is certainly exciting research as, eliminating the virus could prevent or treat the commonest form of dementia, Alzheimer's. Food for thought. And thank you to Chris Gibbons who brought this article in the Economist to my attention.

THE INTERESTING STORY OF THE HOT CROSS BUN

Hot cross buns have been a staple of Easter festivities since their introduction in 12th century England. Brother Thomas Rodcliffe, a Christian monk at St Albans Abbey, developed a similar recipe called an "Alban Bun" and distributed the bun to the poor on Good Friday.

Interestingly, their origins trace back to pagan traditions, predating Christianity. In ancient Egypt, small round breads adorned with crosses were used to honour the gods. The cross symbolically divided the bread into four equal parts, representing either the four phases of the moon or the four seasons, depending on the celebration. Subsequently, Greeks and Romans presented similar sweet rolls as offerings to Eos, the goddess of dawn, and Eostre, the goddess of Spring, who inspired the name for the Easter holiday.

Although the origin may be uncertain, we all love our Hot Cross buns and Woolworths has realised this and have given us these delightful buns year-round! They frequently find their way into my shopping basket alongside banana muffins!

But now, keep an eye out for the new Hot Cross Bun Loaf! Here's my latest, yet-tobe-made recipe for Easter Hot Cross Buns Breakfast.

EASTER BUN FRENCH TOAST BREAKFAST

- Woolworths hot cross loaf OR hot cross buns
- Milk
- Vanilla Essense
- 3 eggs
- knob of butter

Slice bread into thick slices or cut buns through the middle.

Beat the eggs with 30ml of milk, a splash of vanilla essence (or a sprinkle of vanilla seeds). Soak the bread or buns for a minute or two.

Fry in butter until golden, and serve with crispy bacon and Maple syrup. Happy Easter!




Onsienlikheid

I confess I haven't seen it yet - it's on my list recommended by friends and gets 100% on Rotten Tomatoes.




Mars is once again in the spotlight of human interest. Elon Musk who is no stranger to trumpeting on about space, has set his sights on going to Mars and forming a colony. Can it be done and what are the problems?

On April 5th Mars is in conjunction (close to) with a first quarter Moon in the north western evening sky. Pollux, the right hand twin of Gemini is close



by and makes a good comparison. Mars (Ares in Greek mythology) was the son of Zeus and Hera, neither of whom liked him. In Homer's epic war poem (The Iliad) he is called murderous, bloodstained and the curse of mortals. Remembered as the Roman god of war, this distinctive red planet varies in brightness due to its elongated orbit around the Sun. It can be difficult to locate and identify as it often looks like another red star. Of all the planets Mars is the one that most resembles Earth, its day is almost exactly the same length although its seasons are twice as long, as its year is 687 Earth days. At its furthest distance from the Sun, its elongated orbit causes it to graze the asteroid belt and is probably how it captured its two small moons, Phobos and Deimos. It has a diameter of 6786 km, and it would take 9 Mars to equal one Earth in size.

The red planet has long been the favoured home of extraterrestrial intelligence, although recent missions to and on the planet have not discovered any to date! HG Well's famous novel 'War of the Worlds' was based on aliens from Mars and had a profound effect on generations of science fiction stories. Vast dust storms rage across the planet and can be seen through telescopes on Earth. The Martian surface is rugged and covered in a thin red dust. The evidence of erosion on the surface means there may have been free flowing water in its past. Mars has the largest volcano in the Solar System, named Olympus Mons, it is three times higher than Mount Everest. The base of the volcano would cover an area larger than England and its caldera (crater) would swallow London. Its thin atmosphere (less than 1% of Earth's) consists of 95% carbon dioxide with only trace amounts of oxygen and water vapour. Not an atmosphere conducive to life as we know it.



Mars compared to Africa in size

The lack of a global magnetic field on Mars along with the planet's thin atmosphere, means high energy cosmic rays and solar particles shower the surface. Extreme temperatures, low gravity and lack of free water will certainly present major challenges to any human mission. High doses of radiation and the associated health risks will be a further deterrent to human activity on the red planet and for the trip there and back.



There have been a series of missions to Mars, and the US Vikings Orbiters and Landers have been particularly successful. Recently, China, India, UAE and EU have also sent successful missions to Mars. At present rovers on the surface have sent back a myriad of detail and an initial human landing was scheduled for 2025 but it appears more likely in the 2030's. The journey to Mars orbit takes about 7-10 months if a landing was made, the overall mission would take in excess of 2 years, a very long time in space.

Whilst it is theoretically possible to have sexual intercourse in zero or microgravity, the challenges are many. At present there is no recorded incident of sexual activity in space by any astronauts. The dangers for a human foetus in microgravity are enormous and it is not known whether it would be severely deformed, if it survived. Childbirth always has its own inherent problems, and in microgravity they would be formidable. Fluids would migrate to an enlarged skull, and muscle and skeletal development severely constrained. Our typical sci-fi idea of an Alien, with its enlarged head and skinny body may well be the future of space birth. \checkmark

Elon Musk appears to have his heart set on Mars for the future of humans. With the challenges that will face all Mars missions his next 14 children will not be easy. 😂




